Her big break came last year when not only was she offered the role of Snowball in Bad Girls but also that of Dr Heather Lincoln in Casualty. Naturally, her parents were thrilled. She found the kidnap scenes exciting to film. "It's all to do with Ritchie [the son of inmate Yvonne Atkins], who Snowball adores. She's really down in this series but is still focused on getting out of Larkhall and being with her true love. Her love for him is her one redeeming feature.

Nicole lives in Greenwich with her long-time boyfriend, a fellow actor. "He's been very supportive and proud of me with these two roles. We open my fan mail and he reads out all the funny letters," she says.

Nicole's seaside childhood was idyllic, and she returns there as often as possible. She has a younger brother and sister and says, as the eldest, she still feels responsible for them. 'I hope I'm a nice older sister. We speak all the time on the phone and are very close as a family."

Despite starring in two of TV's top shows, Nicole's life hasn't changed much. "I live in the same flat although I'm considering buying a house in Dorset - and I have the same friends and spend the same amount of money. The difference is I can now afford it! I do take more taxis now and feel less guilty about it but that's the only change."

She freely admits to being starstruck. "Meeting people like Stephanie Beacham and Amanda Barrie - both of whom are now in Bad Girls - is incredible. Being in the same programmes as them is exciting because they're such icons."

She relishes the idea of being a big star herself. "I'd love to be a star and have all that glitterati thing. I'm finding it all really exciting and hope it carries on. I've loved doing this shoot today. Who wouldn't? Having your hair and make-up done and being made to look fabulous -

Her roots are very much in musical theatre and her first love is singing. Recently, she was able to combine both singing and her Bad Girls job when she took part in workshops for the proposed Bad Girls musical. I played Shell Dockley, Debrah Stephenson's role in the series. It was weird because I'd done some scenes with Debrah as Snowball. I loved doing the musical. It's still in the early stages but I'd love to do it in the West End if it came to that.'

She wouldn't mind having another shot at Dr Heather Lincoln, either. 'It was a shame she was a bit of a bad doctor. Maybe she could improve and come back, maybe go into Holby City where they didn't know she was so bad before!
